How are we to read Billy Pilgrim?

• Are Vonnegut and Billy Pilgrim one in the same?

Evidence in the First Chapter: Cacicedo: Freud's Symptomology of Trauma (struggle to remember traumatic events, writing is therapeutic First Chapter is "pure autobiography" Matheson: Chapter 1 means of tracing author's evolving attitude Showcases Vonnegut's position Process of writing=cathartic release

Evidence at the end of the Novel: Edelstein: Vonnegut distances himself starting in 2nd chapter Narrator attends World's Fair and begins questioning his own present- this is when Billy and Vonnegut become one



Is the novel autobiographical in the sense that Billy and Vonnegut are both victims?

Vees-Gulani: Uses psychiatric theory to offer insight into author's own psyche Billy and Vonnegut both victims of PTSD Novel=manifestation of Vonnegut's emotional/psychological struggle Billy's story is closely tied with Vonnegut's own experience Publishing Slaughterhouse-Five=integral step in Vonnegut's healing Gallagher: References interviews with Vonnegut in order to establish links between Pilgrim's conflict of duality and identity and Vonnegut's Novel=catharsis for Vonnegut Foreshadowing hints to parallels between author and character



Is Billy merely a fictionalized reflection of Vonnegut's experiences, and not a direct voice?

Kunze: Vonnegut uses his own experiences to save others from similar fate Vonnegut "uses [novel to warn the future of the threat of human indifference and ignorance"

"Vonnegut may be sympathetic to Billy, but does not rally behind Billy's approach to the world"

Hume: character reflects his own life and as a result, Vonnegut creates a hero archetype



Is Billy a Christ Figure?

Cacicedo: Draws comparisons between Billy and Vonnegut in "re-existing the gospel message of Christ to his disciples

Billy is essentially reborn=Vonnegut's way of rewriting many long held myths

Edelstein: "So it goes..." example of renewal, cyclical pattern, similarity to Christ and rebirth "Billy is reborn from a womb-like, pleasant death (the obstetricians look at the suffering of the horse as they would have looked at Christ being taken down from the cross) not into paradise but into a life that is filled with the horrors of actual death."
