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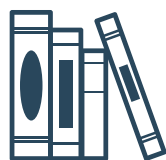

Course Description



This course will teach you how to use library tools effectively in order to locate quality sources. In addition, we will discuss how to evaluate and use those sources properly. By the end of this course, we will have worked towards becoming metaliterate learners and successful researchers!

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, you will be able to:



Develop compelling research questions



Employ effective and efficient search strategies to find a range of appropriate information sources



Critically evaluate information according to discipline specific parameters of authority



Identify contextually appropriate tools and resources to answer research questions



Use information ethically, avoiding plagiarism and respecting the intellectual property of others



Contribute to ongoing scholarly conversation by producing new information content and building on previous scholarly efforts

Course Expectations

1. **Check OAKS often.** There are multiple assignments each week, and it's important to complete them all. Be prepared to spend 4-5 hours a per week on coursework. See the module and assignment breakdowns for deadlines (page 4).
2. **Be ready to actively engage!** This course will utilize the Discussion board in OAKS and other tools. Collaboration and participating is essential in order for you to have an excellent course experience and to learn from our community.
3. **Utilize the right tools.** The basics? You are required to have a working computer with reliable Internet and to setup your student Google Apps account. This is in addition to the use of OAKS.
4. **Complete assignments on time.** Work at your own pace within each week. Be realistic with your time, and if you ever have an issue, email me ASAP.*
5. **Respect is essential.** Being online does not mean you are invincible; students must feel free to share thoughts and ideas in a nonthreatening space. Agree and disagree respectfully.
6. Remember: **Online does not mean EASY.** This course covers the same things we would cover in a Face to Face course, but there is more responsibility on you to actively participate, especially since it is Express. Please let me know if you ever have any questions!

*Computer failure/unavailability is not an excuse for failing to complete assignments by the due date.

Attendance Policy:

- Attendance will be verified upon completion of the assignments for each module. All assignments are due by 11:59 pm on the Due Date indicated on the syllabus. You are in danger of being dropped from the roll if I do not have your assignments for Module 1 by March 5. If this occurs, I will reach out to you via your CofC email the day immediately following the Module 1 deadline, and again, if necessary, two days after. If you do not respond by the deadline set in these follow-up emails, action will be taken to remove you from the class roll.
- If 20% of the work assigned to date is not complete at any point, you may be withdrawn for excessive absence (WA). Failure to participate in our OAKS class for ten (10) days in a row will result in a WA. As a reminder, a WA is the equivalent to failing the course.

Class Climate

- Respect disagreement. I expect everyone in the class to respect others’ rights to speak, to listen attentively to what is said, and to use discretion and sensitivity when speaking. This does not mean you have to agree with everything said. Debate is a valuable component of a learning community.
- Please help each other with problems, especially in the Course Lounge discussion forum. If you notice a colleague has asked a question or written about an issue, jump in and offer your assistance or expertise.

Appropriate printed style manuals are on reserve at the Circulation Desk in Addlestone Library and are also available in the Reference section of your public library. In addition, the CofC Citation Styles Research Guide contains links to online tutorials and guides. You can check your citations with me in my office, via Skype, or by email, and I will happily point you in the right direction.

Watch and Read: Each module will contain brief lectures, tutorials, and readings. Allow two hours each week to explore this content. Remember: OAKS tells me who has watched and engaged with these resources!

Weekly Assignments and Quizzes: You will be required to complete any assignments and quizzes due for each module. Unless otherwise stated, all assignments are due on the Due Date indicated on the syllabus.

Included in the weekly assignments is our Research Planning Workbook. You are welcome to work at your own pace on this, but be aware that 1. each component reflects a specific thing we are working in that related module and 2. I will not grade your work before it's due date.

Annotated Bibliography: You will be researching a topic of your own interest this course, but I encourage you to consider research papers in other classes this semester.

Your Annotated Bibliography will be the tool to prepare for the Infographic Research Project.

Infographic Research Project: The purpose of this project is to provide more meaningful context to the research you will be conducting. More information about infographics will be provided throughout the semester.

Weekly Discussion Board and Class Engagement: Posting to the discussion board and commenting to two of your classmates posts each week is required. This is the best place to engage with your classmates. The readings and videos are there to help encourage dialogue. Be sure to agree or disagree respectfully with your classmates. Your posts should be relevant, thoughtful and thorough and are due by the deadline of each module; comments submitted after the due date will not be graded. Finally, be sure to maintain your threads, and respond and engage respectfully with your classmates!

Final Exam: Your final exam is a reflective assignment and will be due in OAKS.
